

COLLEGE OF NURSES EMPLOYED IN COMMUNITY PHARMACIES TO SUPPORT THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC RESPONSE PRACTICE GUIDELINE

The Nova Scotia College of Nursing (NSCN) is the regulatory body for licensed practical nurses (LPNs), registered nurses (RNs) and nurse practitioners (NPs) in Nova Scotia. Our mandate is to protect the public by promoting the provision of safe, competent, ethical and compassionate nursing services by our registrants. The term nurse in this document refers to LPNs, RNs and NPs unless otherwise stated.

Pharmacies have, and continue to, play a vital role in the Nova Scotian response to the COVID-19 pandemic. In the past, pharmacies have confidently operated many influenza vaccine clinics, as well as provided general wellness screening. As part of the COVID-19 response, community pharmacies will provide some COVID-19 vaccines, as well as testing for COVID-19. Community pharmacies may employ nurses to support these functions.

The COVID-19 vaccines in use are new and it is anticipated that Health Canada will continue to approve more vaccines and populations to be vaccinated throughout 2021 and beyond. For many of these COVID-19 vaccines, handling and storage requirements differ from vaccines that are more common. Clinical information and guidance about them is constantly evolving. Nurses and other health care providers must stay current with evolving information on the vaccines and updates from Nova Scotia Public Health.

Nurses employed in community pharmacies to administer COVID-19 tests and the COVID-19 vaccine should consider the following:

General Guidance

- Administration of the COVID-19 vaccines to all approved populations including children is within the scope of practice of all nurses.
- Collection and processing of samples for COVID-19 testing are within the scope of practice of all nurses.
- The Nova Scotia College of Nursing (NSCN) and Nova Scotia College of Pharmacists (NSCP) have developed
 a <u>Joint Statement on Nurses Employed in Community Pharmacies to Support the COVID-19 Pandemic</u>
 response.
- Nurses are expected to meet their designation-specific <u>Standards of Practice</u> and <u>Code of Ethics</u> where ever they practice and may use this practice support tool in conjunction with their standards and code.
- Nurses must possess the necessary competence (knowledge, skill, and judgment) to collect and process COVID-19 samples, administer the COVID-19 vaccines and manage adverse reactions, including the administration of epinephrine.
- Nurses may obtain the competence to administer vaccines to all approved populations (including the COVID-19 vaccines) by completing employer-based education, learning modules supported by the employer, such as the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) online education courses, or a combination of both.
- The <u>Nova Scotia COVID-19 Vaccine Program: Information for Health Care Professionals</u> developed by Nova Scotia Public Health is a critical resource for nurses and other health care providers. The document will be updated by Nova Scotia Public Health as evidence on COVID-19 and COVID-19 vaccines evolve. Nurses and other health care providers should save the link to this document and review it regularly for updates. The document also includes links to important references and provides answers to questions relevant to nurses and other healthcare providers in a Q&A format.

Authority to Test and Administer COVID-19 Vaccines

- Nurses may administer COVID-19 vaccines in accordance with the direction described in the <u>Nova Scotia</u> <u>COVID-19 Vaccine Program</u> document (See the *Storage and Dosing, Scheduling and Administration* section for more information).
- Nurses may collect and process COVID-19 tests in accordance with test manufactures direction and the policy and procedure of the pharmacy.

Collaborative Practice

- Nurses and pharmacists are autonomous practitioners, each accountable for their actions at all times.
- Nurses and pharmacists are responsible to collaborate with each other as necessary.
- Nurses should consult with the pharmacist and or other health care providers when necessary and in accordance with the direction described in the Nova Scotia COVID-19 Vaccine Program.

Client Assessment

- Nurses are required to assess clients and determine their eligibility for testing and the COVID-19 vaccine.
- Nurses should refer to the *Special Considerations and Contraindications* sections of the <u>Nova Scotia COVID-19 Vaccine Program</u> document to support and guide their decision-making.

Informed Consent and Education

- Nurses must obtain the client's informed consent for testing and for a COVID-19 vaccine.
- Nurses should refer to Appendix 1: Guidance for Health Care Providers of the Nova Scotia COVID-19 Vaccine
 Program document for guidance and support regarding informed consent of immunocompromised persons and persons with underlying autoimmune diseases.
- Nurses should refer to the <u>Guidance for Consent Management Pathways</u> section of the <u>Nova Scotia</u>
 <u>COVID-19 Vaccine Program</u> document for guidance and support to make decisions about when, and with
 whom they must consult about immunocompromised persons and persons with underlying autoimmune
 diseases.
- Nurses should refer to the COVID-19 Vaccines in Canada and COVID-19 Vaccine Safety and Adverse Events
 Following Immunization (AEFI) sections of the Nova Scotia COVID-19 Vaccine Program document for
 guidance and support as they provide education to clients.

Policy

Nurses should be aware of and follow existing pharmacy policy or process regarding the management
of adverse reactions, clients who experience a health emergency while in the pharmacy and clients not
qualifying for a test or vaccine.

Liability Insurance

- Nurses <u>licensed</u> with NSCN receive <u>professional liability protection</u> from a third-party vendor as part of their license.
- Liability protection applies in all settings and practice contexts where the nurse is employed.
